
APPRENTICESHIP CLASSES WILL RUN 8 WEEKS MON-FRI – APR 29-JUNE 21



A Hairstylist cuts and styles hair; and provides chemical services, such as permanent waving, straightening and colouring. This program includes all the in-school training required to complete the requirements of the Level 1 Apprenticeship Program as defined by the Apprenticeship Branch of the Ministry of Training, Colleges and Universities.

A general machinist (429A) is a skilled craftsperson who sets up and operates precision metal cutting and grinding machines such as lathes, milling machines, drills, shapers, boring mills and grinders.
