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ST. CLAIR CATHOLIC SCHOOLS PARTICIPATE IN ONTARIO BULLYING AWARENESS AND PREVENTION WEEK

The third week of November is Bullying Awareness and Prevention Week in Ontario. During this time, students, parents and staff across the province are encouraged to learn more about bullying and its effect on student learning and well-being.

"Our Student Support Service Team provides on-going, proactive programming through a number of bullying prevention strategies in our schools," says Deb Crawford, Superintendent of Education.

"These programs help students to develop positive characteristics of resilience, self-esteem, self-respect and empowerment, which help build conflict resolution, problem-solving and empathy-building skills," says Mrs. Crawford.

Among the many programs deployed by schools across the district are:

- PBS Positive Behaviour Supports, which helps build a school-wide culture in which social and academic success is more likely. It helps to create an effective learning environment for all students.
- Kelso's Choice a program for primary and junior divisions. The program breaks down complex concepts into simpler ideas, where learning about character development and conflict management become fun and effective.
- Diversity Kit a program to help students develop empathy and compassion for each other. It teaches them to recognize each other's strengths and to understand that we are all different and unique in special ways. It reinforces that we should "Live Like Jesus."

During Ontario Bullying Awareness and Prevention Week schools across the district have planned a number of activities, to support their on-going work to build healthy, positive school communities.

Through the use of songs, stories and role-playing, Parents' Choice award-winning singer and educator Paul Behnke teaches children strategies for dealing with bullies. Physical, emotional and verbal bullying are addressed during the presentation.

Monday, Nov. 19 – A presentation, <i>The Bully and the Purple Plants</i>, will provide students with effective strategies for dealing with verbal and physical bullying. Wednesday, Nov. 21 – students will be wearing pink to show solidarity against bullying.

Wednesday, November 21 – Spirit Day. All students will be dressed in blue. Wednesday, November 21 – School Family or Tiger Den activity day. The theme for the sessions will have an anti-bullying message. There will be announcements each day which focus on the theme, including statistics, strategies for bullying prevention and key facts.

She shares a powerful, effective, choice-making formula that helps students discover how to make great choices that impact their lives and those around them in a positive way. St. Anne Catholic School – Blenheim	Americo Todino 519-676-7352	 During Bullying Prevention Week teachers will be reviewing with students the steps they can take to help stop bullying: 1) tell the bully to stop; 2) walk away; 3) tell a trusted adult. Students will be creating a "Choice Bank" to help teach them they are in control of their own choices.

St. Matthew Catholic School	Kevin Cannon 519-332-4300	 Tuesday, November 20 at 9:15 a.m. – Big Kids' Entertainment Play – Snow White, which has an antibullying message. Student council members will be reading books with an anti-bullying theme to primary/junior classes throughout the week.

Each day – there will be classroom activities, such as students writing stories and poems about how bullying affects them. Wed., Nov. 21 – Grade 8 students will paint a school mural, reflecting an anti-bullying message.

All week teachers will be reading storybooks and novels with an anti-bullying message. Students have created anti-bullying posters and they are on display in the school.
St. Joseph Catholic School, Tilbury	Julie Faubert 519-682-2790	 Student Council is leading activities all week: Week kicks off with a student led liturgy, focusing on peace and respect. Student Council will create posters and banners with an anti-bullying message, which will be displayed throughout the school. A "Caught You" team will hand out tickets to students who display acts of kindness and respect. The tickets will be put into a draw for pizza. Door decorating contest in which each class is required to send a positive message about friendship, inclusion and peace. A special day will be held in which all students will be asked to wear white shirts to signify peace.

Senior students will perform skits demonstrating the importance of always reporting bullying. Classes will investigate websites included in a Be Part of the Solution – Help Stop Bullying brochure that has been sent home. The school's Child and Youth Workers will visit classrooms to help focus students on empathy for the victim in a bullying situation, as well as the important role of the bystander.
St. Ursula Catholic School	Kerry Matthyssen 519-352-3620	Several activities have been coordinated through the St. Ursula Safe School Committee: Kickoff event on Monday – 20 minute session in the gym with classes being introduced to an anti-bullying pledge and viewing a Do The Right Thing skit. The Do The Right Thing Team will highlight the role of the bystander in a bullying situation, with follow-up activities throughout the week.

St. Christopher Catholic Secondary School	Brendan Deery 519-541-1811	 Media Studies students have produced public service announcements, which will run on St. Christopher TV all week. Communications Technology classes have produced posters with an anti-bullying message, which will be displayed throughout the building. Student Council has planned anti-bullying activities for the lunch periods on Tuesday, Nov. 20. The Social Justice Group has planned activities for the lunch periods on Wednesday, Nov. 21. Thursday, Nov. 22 is designated as "Pink Spirit/Jean Day". The school has ordered 200 t-shirts to promote anti-bullying awareness.

Monday morning – Student led reflection to introduce Bullying Awareness and Prevention Week and the goals for St. Patrick's students. Wed., Nov. 21 – Homeroom activity – helping students to "Stand Up". Teachers will lead a short activity, which teaches students what to do when they are the bystander, to "Stand Up" to the bully. Wednesday, Nov., 21 – during lunch – pink bake sale and Stand-Up t-shirt sales – Proceeds to Rebound. Thurs., Nov. 22 during lunch – students will be asked to sign the Stand Up Banner as a pledge to help stop bullying.
