## FROM THE GUIDANCE DEPARTMENT



**Grade 12 students** are reminded of the following:

1. Students should complete their **forty hours of Community Service** prior to the start of Semester 2 in order to graduate next June. In order to be considered for early acceptance to university and college, students should have their community service hours completed.
2. Students are reminded that the due date for **university applications** is **January 15, 2016** and the due date for **college applications** is **February 1, 2016**. If you do not have your PIN to apply to university or your OEN to apply to college, please see the Guidance Secretary.
3. Students are strongly advised to apply to university or college before the Christmas Holidays as the application websites get very busy before the due dates and there is no customer support available during the Christmas Holidays.

**Grade 9 students :**

1. The guidance counsellors are currently meeting with all Grade Nine students. Grade Nine students who have missed their appointments should reschedule their appointments by seeing Ms. Hogle, the Guidance Secretary.

### Focus more on kindness and less on bullying

Many traditional anti bullying programs focus on reducing the negative behaviours which research states actually heightens the behavior we want to stop. If schools, communities and parents were to focus on teaching kindness and compassion to each other, positive behaviours would occur. People need to learn that kindness is contagious and does create better relationships and friendships among those they encounter.

### Did you know???

-Studies have shown that showing a picture that evokes positive emotion (eg. Puppies dancing) before giving students a test – they will have improved test results over those who didn't have the positive emotion experience pre-test.

When positive emotions are in short supply people get stuck yet if positive emotions are in ample supply, people do better,

Practicing positive psychology (complimenting someone else, prayer, smiling , etc). everyday can improve mood in most people, including children and youth.

### Ten Foot and Five Foot Rule : Try it and see what happens

The “Ten Foot, Five Foot Rule” is generally a grassroots strategy, for people dealing with people. This can be tried with your staff, students and parents. It is really a simple strategy:

Within ten feet or so of a student or staff or parent, you should acknowledge them with a smile. Within five feet or so of that person, you should acknowledge them verbally. It may be a simple, “Good morning,” or “Great day today,” and end with a smile. The idea is to create a small positive interaction between you and that person. Research states that this approach has actually changed school cultures, workplace environments and some communities. This very simple easy strategy needs practicing with all in the school community. Try it and see the difference!
