During the month of April our journey to the cross comes to an end. The month of April has also seen St. Patrick's 19th annual Cyclone Aid as well as a province wide transition to a virtual learning platform for what is currently an indefinite period of time.

Cyclone Aid

The St. Patrick's Fighting Irish are always committed to giving back to their community and one of the ways they like to do this is through their yearly can drive, Cyclone Aid. During the Easter season, St. Patrick's school partners with a local charity and food bank, The Inn of the Good Shepherd, to provide meals to local families. In a normal year, staff and students would canvas the city going door to door to collect cans and other non-perishable food items. This year however, due to the ongoing Covid-19 pandemic, this was not possible. Regardless of circumstances, the Fighting Irish were not going to let Covid stop them from being the hands and feet of Christ: instead, they launched their first ever virtual Cyclone Aid! Rather than collecting cans, they collected monetary donations that were then given to the Inn of the Good Shepherd, allowing them to



purchase whatever materials and supplies they may need. Myles Vanni, the Executive Director of the Inn of the Good Shepherd was quoted saying, “It’s tremendous that the students and staff of St. Pat’s are keen to carry on the tradition of CycloneAid, which is really more than just collecting food – it’s about learning to care for others.” It is important now more than ever to help local charities like The Inn of the Good Shepherd as many have seen an increase in need due to Covid. From last April to September, The Inn distributed over 6000 emergency food boxes. Additionally, in a normal, pre-Covid year, The Inn had 35 people in their shelter whereas now, they are feeding and sheltering more than 220 individuals. This year they managed to raise \$12,300 which will go a long way toward helping individuals throughout the community.



School Yard Clean Up

April 22nd marks Earth Day; a day for us to celebrate and protect the place that all 7.2 billion of us call home. In the spirit of Earth Day, Mrs. Ellis-Woodward and her grade 10 History class decided to demonstrate their stewardship by helping to clean up the school yard. Ms. Ellis-Woodward and her students went around the school grounds (that borders the Howard Watson Trail, a very popular

exercise path) and any litter they found, separated it into 3 separate bags: paper, plastic and garbage. 
