Back to the Books

With 2021 upon us and Christmas break behind us, it is now time to settle back into the school routine. Things have changed over the two weeks we've been away but no matter what is thrown at them, the Fighting Irish will continue to conquer it with their determination and positive attitudes. As Covid-19 numbers continue to rise, it is important to remember to wash your hands, wear a mask and follow social distancing protocols to keep everyone safe.

Irish Miracle

The St. Pat's tradition known as "Irish Miracle" was reimagined in a covid-friendly way in its 37th year. In a normal year, students canvas Sarnia and neighbouring cities, going door to door collecting non-perishable food items. The food collected is normally donated to St. Vincent de Paul and benefits the needy within our parishes. This year, with church halls closed and



students unable to go door to door, St. Pat's and St. Vincent de Paul raised money, allowing people to donate from the safety of their own homes. Martina Austin is a teacher at St. Pat's and one of the organizers of Irish Miracle with 21 years of volunteer experience with the drive. Austin had this to say when asked about why Irish Miracle is important to the school: "We're doing what Jesus did, helping just because it's the right thing to do treating others as the body of Christ within the body of Christ." The money raised provided grocery/gift cards for families so they could buy what they needed for their families. Money that wasn't used for the cards was used to purchase more food to stock the food bank. "Thank you so much for your generosity over 37 years" said Mrs. Austin "but thank you especially for this year. In a time when some money, food and resources have been tough, people have been asked to give so many times and yet they just keep giving. St. Patrick's and St. Vincent de Paul have raised a combined total of \$21,971.55 to benefit local families.



Vatican Observatory Q&A

On December 9th, staff and students of St. Patrick's High School and the virtual school were given the opportunity to speak with Brother Guy Consolmagno, the Director of the Vatican Observatory. Brother Consolmagno is a planetary scientist whose primary areas of research are

asteroids and meteorites. Brother Consolmagno shared a bit about his life, his time at MIT and abroad. He also answered questions posed to him by staff and students such as "Are science and faith mutually exclusive?", "What are black holes?", "Why were we given free will?" and "What would the existence of alien life mean to Christianity?" Brother Consolmagno who has written books such as *Brother Astronomer* (2000), *God's Mechanics: How Scientists and Engineers Make Sense of Religion* (2008) and *Would You Baptize an Extraterrestrial?* (2014) was able to answer the questions with his studies and personal anecdotes. Thank you Brother Consolmagno for sharing your knowledge with us.

E-Learning

Certainly one of the biggest things to have happened during these months is the provincewide temporary switch to virtual learning. Mr. Kehoe, the principal of St. Patrick's had this to say about the switch to virtual learning: "The transition to on-line was very smooth. Aside from a province wide internet outage on the first day, teachers and students have been successfully engaged in on-line teaching



and learning. We were able to support students who did not have technology as early as the first day back (Monday, January 4th) so that everyone has been able to access their education." In school learning is projected to be able to resume on Monday, January 25, 2021.



Academic Awards


