


Remember November

The Arts


The virtual school's students have been very busy this month and Ms. Magliaro's grade 11/12 drama and grade 12 visual art classes are no exception. Both classes decided that for their culminating project they would take on a

piece with the goal to inform others on their chosen topic. The virtual students decided to create a piece entitled "Mother Nature's Nightmares". An excerpt from their artist's statement reads "There are many environmental issues we face in this world as a whole. This installation reflects these issues with different water bottles. Each water bottle that is hung on the tree with fishing wire is a representation of some of the situations we as a species are creating that are harming our planet." The statement goes on to explain what the different colours signify, for example: the murky yellow water with gears is meant to signify the environmental effects of industrial pollution, the black water with seashells represents oil spills and the green water represents chemicals used in farming. The virtual drama class decided that for their culminating, they would write and perform a play. "QuaranTEEN" talks about life as a highschool student stuck in quarantine.
