## A Time to Give Thanks and Reflect

With October upon us, the days get cooler and the leaves begin to fall. This month is a time for joy and almsgiving as we celebrate Thanksgiving, thanking God for another bountiful harvest and all of our many blessings. The month of October is also a time for solemn reflection as we observe *Orange Shirt Day*, a day dedicated to 150, 000

First Nation, Métis and Inuit children taken from their homes and forced into residential schools.

#### **Orange Shirt Day**

September 30th, 2020, Orange Shirt Day, is a day for Canadians to educate themselves about the atrocities faced by First Nation, Métis and Inuit children at the hands of the residential school system. Orange Shirt Day was created by Phyllis Webstad, a woman who was forced into a residential school as a child. It began when Phyllis shared her experience of arriving at the residential school where the orange shirt she wore (given to her by her grandmother) was taken from her. Phyllis' orange shirt and her message that "every child matters" is one that has been spread throughout Canada. The students at St. Patrick's and online participated



in a variety of activities to learn more about residential schools and their lasting impact. In Ms. Magliaro's grade 11/12 virtual drama class, students produced a video sharing facts, statistics and stories of survivors. The video, read as a choral arrangement, was written and performed by the students. At St. Patrick's, Orange Shirt Day consisted of a

schoolwide presentation on the lasting impact of residential schools. Staff and students of both the physical and virtual school were encouraged to wear an orange shirt to demonstrate solidarity and support for everyone affected by residential schools.



#### **Thanksgiving**

Thanksgiving: a time for family, food and most importantly, thanking God for his many gifts. In a normal year, St. Patrick's would hold a mass to celebrate but though it wasn't possible this year to gather together in the school gym to worship, the Fighting Irish didn't let that stop them from practicing their faith.

Staff and students took part in a virtual Thanksgiving Prayer Service. The virtual service included St. Patrick's chaplin, Mrs. Clarke, sharing about how Thanksgiving ties into the school's religious focus this year which is "Choose Joy". The service also features scripture passages read by students as well as "on the street interviews" with staff and students. In these interviews, taken when classes are outside on break, staff and students are asked a variety of questions including what they are thankful for. The answers to this question varied greatly from person to person but some of the recurring answers included: family, friends, health and being back at St. Patrick's. The virtual service also includes a beautiful performance of the song "Oceans" performed by a few grade 11 students at St. Patrick's.
