Corner Store was selling orange shirts to ensure that all students and staff could participate in the event. On the morning of Orange Shirt Day, our Student Council and Mrs. Woodward and her broadcast team hosted a reflective broadcast for the event. The broadcast included traditional



Indigenous drumming, singing, and dancing all themed around healing and reconciliation; messages and reflections from local elders and members of our local First Nation Communities; traditional Indigenous prayers; and a moment of silence. This provided the opportunity for all members of the St. Patrick's community to learn more about Indigenous culture and the impacts of Canadian Residential Schools.



TERRY FOX RUN

This month, Mrs. Woodward's grade twelve Business Leadership class hosted our school's Terry Fox campaign. On Wednesday, October 12, the class hosted a morning broadcast featuring educational and awareness videos regarding Terry's journey, the impacts of cancer, and cancer research. Afterwards, classes were invited outside to participate in a Terry Fox walk around the school track. Leading up to the event, Mrs. Woodward's class advertised and promoted donating to the school's Terry Fox campaign with a goal of raising \$4000.
