LIVING OUR FAITH Leadership in Our Schools - A Message on Joy and Love from Father John Comiskey

Father John Comiskey was the featured speaker at St. Clair Catholic's annual gathering, *The Great Family of Our Church - Our Annual Day of Faith and Learning Together*, in February. Father Comiskey is Moderator of the Curia for the Diocese of London.

"We are extremely grateful and honoured that Father John made time available in his busy schedule to attend our two-day conference in the St. Clair district," says Dan Parr, Director of Education. "Father's theme for the events was *Joy in Life - Leadership in Catholic Education* and he had a tremendous message for each of us who attended."

Father Comiskey quoted from a recent Papal encyclical, in which the Holy Father addressed this topic. Pope Francis said, "... the Church must accompany with attention and care the weakest of her children, who show signs of a wounded and troubled love, by restoring in them hope and confidence, like the beacon of a lighthouse in a port, or a torch carried among the people to enlighten those who have lost their way or who are in the midst of a storm."

PROMOTING EDUCATIONAL ACHIEVEMENT & INNOVATION

Our Lady of Fatima Robotics Team Partners with Ministry of Transportation to Develop Deer Crossing Warning System

Members of the Cyber Knights, the robotics team at Our Lady of Fatima Catholic School in Chatham, have helped to develop a system to alert drivers when deer are on the move.

“The students are really excited that officials with the Ministry of Transportation liked their idea and that it is being piloted in the area,” says Dan Rolo, a teacher and robotics team coach at Our Lady of Fatima.

The device they developed consists of a motion-activated exterior light mounted on a post facing away from the highway. Their thinking was that when deer approach the roadway, the light would be triggered, frightening the animal away from the road.

Mr. Rolo reached out to staff from the West Region Ministry of Transportation, and following a meeting further refinements were made. A flashing beacon mounted above a deer alert sign was added, so that motorists would be warned that animals are on the move nearby and to drive with caution.

“It’s so great to see an interest in public safety from such a group of bright young minds like the Cyber Knights. The ministry is very pleased to pilot their invention, and I look forward to the results” says Steven Del Duca, Minister of Transportation.



FOSTERING STEWARDSHIP, LEADERSHIP AND SOCIAL JUSTICE

Canadian Senator Michael MacDonald Speaks to Students at St. Patrick’s Catholic High School

Last May, Hon. Michael MacDonald, a member of the Canadian Senate from Cape Breton, Nova Scotia addressed a group of about 250 students at St. Patrick’s Catholic High School. The visit was arranged by teacher Blake Morrison, who took part in a week-long Teachers Institute on Canadian Parliamentary Democracy in Ottawa.

“We were very excited when Senator MacDonald accepted our invitation to speak to students here at St. Patrick’s,” says Mr. Morrison. “It’s not every day students get to meet a member of the Canadian Senate and ask questions.”

The students, from Grades 10 through 12, were selected because of their interest in politics. They asked a number of questions, ranging from free trade to Canada’s relations with the United States to the national debt.



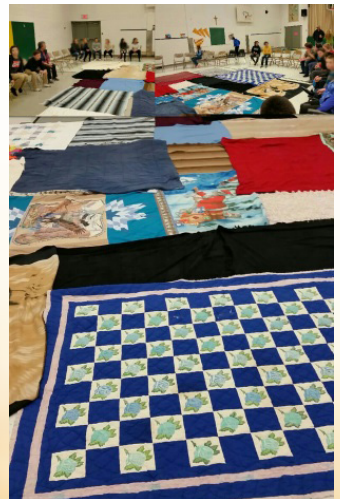
INCLUSIVE SCHOOLS

Blanket Exercise Gives Students a Better Understanding of Indigenous History

Students, staff, members of Bkejwanong Walpole Island First Nation community and representatives of the local parish gathered at St. Elizabeth Catholic School in February to participate in a Blanket Exercise. The exercise is a teaching tool, which helps participants understand the relationship between Indigenous and non-Indigenous peoples in Canada.

The blankets are laid out on the floor to represent “Turtle Island,” the name for North America. The exercise begins 500 years before the first Europeans sailed across the Atlantic. Through narration, events are described that result in the shrinking of Turtle Island. Smallpox, treaties, residential schools and the Indian Act, all result in populations and land disappearing. As a result, blankets are folded and students are asked to leave the blankets while remaining part of the circle learning about the history.

The Blanket Exercise at St. Elizabeth Catholic School was the first in the St. Clair district; however, several others have been held at Catholic schools since.

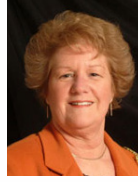
