


Curriculum Connections

Each newsletter we will highlight one of the six strands in the Religious Education Policy Document. Please see the section below highlighting the **Believing strand**.

Exploring the Believing Strand	When reading Scripture, as part of prayer or as part of a classroom learning activity, it is helpful to remember to approach Scripture with reverence. This
 The focus of this strand is primarily on: A. God's self-revelation (in Creation, in the person of Jesus Christ, in Sacred Scripture and in the apostolic tradition of the Church); 	 can be modelled by: Giving the Bible a place of reverence in the classroom (e.g. prayer table); Preparing ourselves and our students (i.e. quiet our minds and hearts) to hear the Word of God; and, Holding the Bible reverently when reading from it.
 B. The Creed as a summary of Catholic belief and the profession of faith; and, 	Listening to and praying with Scripture can be a full sensory experience: imagining ourselves in the scene; what do we hear, smell, feel, and even, what does the food taste like? The most important sense is hearing.
C. The Church as founded by Christ to be one, holy, catholic, and apostolic.	Jesus, who is referred to as the living Word of God, reminds us, "Let anyone with ears listen!" (Matthew 13:9). It is key that we listen to the Word of God (Sacred Scripture), with our heads and our hearts!

Sacred Scripture is the speech of God as it is put down in writing under the breath of the Holy Spirit. Throughout the Religion Curriculum and in daily lessons, educators turn to Sacred Scripture, the Word of God, to know how God has entered into relationship with humanity, to see how faithful God has been and to discern God's will: "Sacred Scripture has a privileged place in Religious Education courses. As a primary source of God's revelation, the Bible records the covenantal relationship between God, the Jewish people and the Christian Church" (Religious Education: Ontario Catholic Elementary Curriculum Policy Document (Grades 1-8), page 26).

As the prophet Isaiah (55:10-11) reminds us, the Word of God is active & effective:

Thus says the Lord:

For as the rain and snow come down from heaven and do not return there until they have watered the earth, making it bring forth and sprout, giving seed to the sower and bread to the eater, so shall my word be that goes forth from my mouth; it shall not return to me empty, but it shall accomplish that which I purpose, and succeed in the thing for which I sent it.


