Important information for students wanting to return for a 5th year at St. Pat's

There has been much discussion among parents and students about a previous announcement from the Ministry of Education, regarding a 34 credit threshold for secondary students. School boards were reminded that over a decade ago, Ontario moved to a four year secondary school program. Since that time, many students have opted to return for a fifth year, for a variety of reasons. The goal of the ministry is to shift our culture and encourage students to graduate in four years, as they do elsewhere in Canada and in the United States. In order to assist with this change in culture, school boards have been provided with supports that will help students to be better prepared to graduate within the four year time frame.

Resources have been provided to better support education in career/life planning. In Grade 7, students have begun to complete their online Individual Pathways Plan (IPP) with their teachers. These plans will be revisited twice a year, with even greater emphasis as students transition into secondary school. This IPP will be a focused activity when students take the Grade 10 careers course and each time they meet with their guidance counselors, throughout their time in secondary school. The policy document, *Creating Pathways to Success* was implemented in our schools in September 2013 for Grades K to 12, which provided resources for teachers.

In addition, students must acquire 40 hours of community service to be eligible for graduation. Grade 8 students may start accumulating community service hours as of July 1, 2016.

The purpose of our Grade 9 orientation is to transition students from elementary school in a way that gives them the best possible start to a successful secondary school experience. Grade 11 and 12 students will serve as leaders and mentors to the Grade 9 class. *Link Crew* is a year-long transition support and community building program that makes a positive difference in students' lives. Through *Link Crew* we connect our incoming Grade 9 students with successful senior student leaders, to create a bond of comfort and familiarity that spans the school age perimeters.

Grade 9 *Link Crew* orientation will be held **Thursday, September 1, 2016 from 8:00 a.m. until 1:00 p.m. in the school gym.** The day will include lunch. 


Through a strong network of volunteers and community connections, the *Breakfast Club* is available to all students five mornings a week throughout the school year and into final exams. During the 2015-2016 school year, more than 20,000 healthy starts have already been provided to the students and well over 100,000 nutritious morning food options have been served since the program's inception. On any given morning, students may have access to bagels, fresh fruit, granola bars, yogurt, cheese, smoothies and many other healthy choices.

A key feature that has contributed to the great success of the program is its adherence to the concept of universal access. *All* students are welcome to take part in the program. Every morning, students are greeted by the smiling faces of our amazing staff volunteers. The *Breakfast Club* has become a safe haven for many and has the feel of a drop-in café. Students and staff share in conversations, laughter and fun.

Our planning team was excited to introduce our "Irish Leaders in Training" to this years experience.
