#### 2. PRESENTATIONS

#### A. Autism Transitional Classroom

Jennifer Morrow

- Nicole Leger, classroom teacher, was unable to attend but will be invited to a later SEAC meeting
- Jen Morrow shared Nicole's slidedeck presentation including videos from the classroom
- The ATC is a partnership between Chatham-Kent Children's Services, the SCCDSB and LKDSB
- Staff includes a psychologist and a Developmental Services Worker from CKCS, and a Classroom Teacher, Principal, Program Resource Consultant and Educational Assistant from the SCCDSB
- The ATC builds capacity in our community and throughout the province through training, Geneva Symposium presentations, and by hosting students from Fanshawe College's Autism and Behaviour Science program

## B. School Climate Survey Results

Chris Preece

- Last school climate survey was completed pre-pandemic, in 2018
- Current school climate survey was completed during a seven week period in April and May of 2021, during a period of virtual learning in Ontario
- Results for each school were shared with principals initially in September, and then shared with staff during October 8 Professional Activity Day
- The survey included a bullying definition, and examples of the types of bullying to ensure understanding of the respondents
- 862 parent responses, 408 staff responses, 1787 students grade 4-8, 1169 students grade 9-12; 46% male, 48% female, 6% non identified and 7% identified as First Nations, Inuit, Metis in elementary and 44% male, 53% female, 3% non identified; 4.5% identified as First Nations, Inuit, Metis in secondary

#### **Elementary School Climate Results:**

- 79% of students reported feeling that school is a safe place some, most or all of the time
- 75% of students reported feeling that they fit in at school





- Top three issues affecting mental health were: pressure to do well in school (new issue), feeling nervous or afraid, and pandemic issues
- 73% of students reported feeling excited to learn
- 36% reported verbal bullying; verbal bullying was reported to be more prevalent than physical, social or cyber bullying
- 63% of students reported having at least one caring adult at school
- 64% reported worrying about school work
- 49% understood the connection between faith and well-being; this will be explored by the team
- 62% report their overall health as being good, very good or excellent

## Secondary School Climate Results:

- 76% of students reported feeling that school is a safe place some, most or all of the time
- 75% of students reported feeling that they fit in at school
- Top three issues affecting mental health were: pressure to do well in school, being nervous or afraid, and sadness
- 68% of students reported feeling excited to learn
- 29% reported verbal bullying (less than in elementary schools)
- 79% of students reported having at least one caring adult at school
- 83% reported worrying about school work
- 54% understood the connection between faith and well-being
- 45% report their overall health as being good, very good or excellent

## Important Findings / Next Steps:

- Three new issues affecting mental health were reported this year: pressure to do well in school (particularly during virtual learning), pandemic issues and sadness
- Researcher employed by the board is assessing the qualitative data in order to prepare a report with recommendations for the Executive Council
- Recommended enhancement of existing work needs to be done to identify caring adults, address bullying and safety in schools, build social-emotional skills (on a continuum, starting with self-awareness, working toward self-regulation), and to educate students, families and staff about well-being supports that are available in schools

#### A. Math Pilot Project

Hollie Sparling

- This is an exciting collaboration between the Curriculum and Special Education departments.
- The purpose of the project is two-fold: to explore effective strategies to support <u>all</u> learners in Mathematics, and to build a partnership between elementary to secondary mathematics and special education.
- This is a timely project as Grade 9 Mathematics courses are now destreamed.
- The pilot program will target Grades 3-8 classes.
- The first round of the pilot involves 6 schools from across the system: Georges P. Vanier, Holy Trinity, St. Joseph Corunna, St. Angela Merici, Holy Family and St. Matthew.
- In the new year, another six schools will have the opportunity to participate in the pilot.

## B. Literacy Project

Terri Rawlings





- The curriculum and special education departments are partnering to explore emergent and early reading development.
- Research in the cognitive and neuroscience domains has shed light on how children develop reading skills, suggesting that all students benefit from explicit, systematic, cumulative and multisensory instruction.
- Beginning with flexibly working with sounds and then moving to orthographic mapping, children crack the reading code.
- Eight schools will be supported this term, and others will be supported in term 2.
- Updates will be provided to this committee throughout the year.

## C. SEAit Update

- Over the past three years, the IT and Special Education departments have been working together to implement a program called SEAit.
- This program is designed to organize submissions, track orders, inventory and deployment of equipment for students identified as needing special equipment to access the curriculum.
- On September 15, 2021, all Program Resource Teachers were trained by Adam Morton from Learn Style on using the SEAit to submit claims for the students in their schools.
