B. PRESENTATIONS

1. Black History Month

Toyin Jegede

- Graduation Coach is a new position that is funded by the Ministry of Education
- The Coach works closely with the students and families of UCC and provides a safe place for black students
- The program has a collaborative approach where people "walk" with the students to provide support through mentorship, and promoting inclusion
- Allows the student's to have a voice by them indicating what they need to see at UCC
- Testimony from students revealed that the program has supported and helped them grow academically, socially and emotionally
- Some events for Black History Month included: a display at UCC from the Buxton Museum, Chatham-Kent Black Excellence Gala Night, and Black History Month Panel Discussion with guest speakers
- Future plans include African Diaspora Youth Conference, Multiculturalism Week, Black Parent Information Night, Scholarship Cafe, After School Workshops and Celebrating Black Excellence at UCC

2. Speech Language Pathologists-Service Delivery

Kayla Taylor, Janice Cornell, Heather Molyneaux, Natascha de Boer

- Moving to a Tiered Service Model that promotes inclusion, and provides universal supports to all students in the school environment
- Tier 1 services provide core intervention for all students. The focus is on classroom-based supports and strategies and are non-child specific. These interventions are to reduce the barriers to learning and provide indicators for early intervention
- Tier 2 services provide the education team with more supplemental instruction to support student's individual needs. Supports are targeted and are of greater frequency and duration. The SLP determines if the child and family need more





intensive and personalized services through consultation with the school team and classroom observations

- Tier 3 services may require formal or standardized assessments to determine the student's strengths and needs and to support a diagnosis by a physician or psychologist, or support a SEA claim for technology. It is intended to be highly individualized for students requiring the highest level of intervention
- The goal of a Tiered Service Delivery Model is to build capacity in educators, promote inclusion, and to support all students within our school community

F. INFORMATION ITEMS

1. Mental Health and Wellbeing Updates

Chris Preece

- Social Emotional Learning Training happened on February 15, 2024. Our SEL schools came together with other schools to train peer-to-peer. This was well received and seven more schools were trained
- There will be a Social Emotional Learning and Wellbeing Celebration June 19-20, 2024, featuring Dr. Kim Schonert-Reichl. We will be doing school visits and looking at what our schools have done
- On April 24, 2024, both Sarnia-Lambton and Chatham-Kent will come together with community partners to look at PPM 169 and how we will be moving forward with our strategic plan, under the guidelines of the PPM
- March 1, 2024 was World Unplug Day. This was a very successful event in our schools: students recognized the importance of unplugging and prices were outdoor themed (e.g., passes to Provincial parks)





• The theme for Mental Health Week this year will be "Healing Through Compassion" and will take place May 5-10, 2024. More information will follow

2. Special Olympics Events

- Special Olympics School Championships will be hosted in Chatham-Kent on June 10-12, 2024. This event will be geared toward secondary athletes aged 14-21. This is the first time the event has been hosted in Chatham in 26 years
- St Patrick's High School hosted two Special Olympics qualifying events this year: basketball and bocce ball
- Special Olympics Ontario is hosting a Sports Festival at St. Angela Merici Catholic School for elementary students on Friday, April 5, 2024. The goal is to provide developmentally-appropriate programming that teaches the fundamentals of movement through a sport-like setting, and fostering a love for physical activity and sportsmanship. 3. Enrichment Activities/Screening Process

Lisa Thompson-Power

- All grade four students in the board are screened every year. Those who meet the criteria are invited to participate in the Enrichment Opportunity, which includes students from grades five to eight
- A new screening tool will be introduced this year: the Canadian Cognitive Abilities Test 7 (CCAT7). It is the most widely used cognitive screening tool in Canada. It is standardized and is used to assess reasoning skills and problem solving abilities related to learning in our schools
- Some of the enrichment activities this year have included: Lambton College STEM course, Ebits which are mini courses designed to be completed in one hour (our students completed Robots, Road Signs and Geodesic Domes); SheepDog Animation who taught our students how to create short animated films, including post-production and sound. Other activities included Communications/ Photography-using green screen to create photos using themselves in a fantasy image

4. New EA Orientation

- In an attempt to replenish our EA supply list, the board has expanded our scope of experience to include nursing and policing services
- A new EA Orientation package was developed by members of the ABA, CST and Wellbeing Teams. Twelve new hirees were involved in the orientation, as well as BMS training, and the feedback from the participants was very positive
