UCC students continue to lead like Jesus. Our chaplain, Mr. Dula, asks us to think of the greatest leader of all times: Jesus. Jesus was the Son of a carpenter and was also from a very small town. Jesus chose 12 ordinary people to become his apostles. They had no training or experience in leadership, and His few dozen disciples also had no title or status, however, Jesus used all of this to change the world! He had one rule which He modeled well: Servant Leadership.

Mr. Dula shared that Ivy League Universities and Fortune 500 companies are now adopting a "servant leadership" model in their teachings and in their strategies. WE SCARE HUNGER

Led by the "Me to We" Team at UCC, more than 250 students and 50 parent volunteers are preparing for our annual "We Scare Hunger" food campaign. Every Halloween the UCC "Me to We" Team works with our Catholic elementary schools, the Chatham public high schools and the community of Chatham-Kent to put food on the shelves at our local food banks through a non-perishable food drive.

Our UCC team leaders along with many student volunteers will be knocking on doors in our

communities to collect non-perishable food donations. Through careful planning all of the volunteers have assigned neighbourhoods and most of the city will be covered. As a backup, if any homes are missed then the residents are invited to drop off their donations at Chatham Outreach for Hunger on Wellington near Williams Street.

If food is collected in Ridgetown and Blenheim then it will stay in those communities. The has become an annual event and is very important for food banks when donations are really needed between Thanksgiving and Christmas. The "We Scare Hunger" campaign represents a significant contribution and allows the food banks to refill their shelves. Chatham Victory Ford is an important community partner as each year they provide trucks to help move the food donations from UCC to Chatham Outreach for Hunger.



COMMUNITY CONNECTION

On October 1st, Lancers participated in the annual Terry Fox Community Walk to commemorate the strength and determination of Canadian Terry Fox. This event brought our entire school community together to support a great cause: raising money for cancer research. We are proud to say that the UCC Lancers raised \$1500!

To remember and honour the indigenous people and their families affected by residential schools, our Lancer population wore orange t-shirts. Over 30 teachers volunteered their class time in recognition of this day. Mrs. Murphy's class decorated our hallways to bring awareness to our history displaying hearts with family names inside them. The Indigenous Leadership of UCC successfully educated us and reminded us that "every child matters"!


